# National Tribal Water Council's 5-Key Water Priorities for the New Administration

In mid-December 2020, the National Tribal Water Council (NTWC) developed a list of 11 tribal water priorities (i.e., 2020/2021 Transition Brief) that would be shared with the incoming new U.S. EPA administration. From that initial 11 priorities, the NTWC identified five (5) key priority actions for the newly appointed EPA Administrator, and the Office of Water. A letter outlining the five (5) key priorities was transmitted to EPA Acting Administrator Ms. Jane Nishida, EPA's Office of International and Tribal Affairs, and asked that the key priorities be shared with the new EPA Administrator Mr. Michael Regan.

It is the goal of the NTWC to advocate for tribes regarding pertinent water issues and priorities. The NTWC looks forward to working with the new administration regarding these priorities along with others important to tribes. The key five (5) priorities are as follows:

- 1. Navigable Waters Protection and Clean Water Act Section 401 Certification Rules
  The NTWC requests the EPA to withdraw its defense of legal challenges brought against
  the Navigable Waters Protection and CWA Section401 Certification rules. The rules were
  issued without proper tribal consultation and have a substantial impact on tribal waters,
  treaty rights, trust obligation, and tribal cultural resources.
- 2. Tribal Baseline Water Quality Standards Rule

  The NTWC urges the EPA to complete and advance the Tribal Baseline Water Quality

  Standards rule. The rule will help fill the regulatory gaps that exist in Indian Country and assist tribes with safeguarding their water supply and quality.
- 3. Increase funding for the Safe Drinking Water Tribal Set-aside Program

  The NTWC requests that the EPA allocate 5% of the Safe Drinking Water State Revolving
  Funds to the Tribal Safe Drinking Water Tribal Set-aside Program. Tribes need additional

funding to address the disparity of safe access to drinking water. Approximately 6% of tribal homes still lack access to safe drinking water, particularly tribes in the southwest and Alaska.

#### 4. Restructure the FY 2022-2023 National Water Program Guidance and Strategic Plan

The NTWC requests the EPA Office of Water reinstate the 13 tribal measures that were removed due to the FY 2018-2019 lean management process. The tribal measures provide critical program information for the protection of human health and environment on tribal lands.

#### 5. EPA Office of Water Infrastructure Task Force

The NTWC requests the EPA Office of Water to reactivate the Infrastructure Task Force to address ongoing critical needs in Indian Country pertaining to drinking water and wastewater infrastructure. The task force and workgroup provide an opportunity to understand the barriers faced by tribal sanitation and drinking water facilities.

As previously mentioned above, the NTWC developed the 2020/2021 Transition Brief. The brief includes water priorities important to tribes and NTWC recommends that the EPA address them within the first 100 days of the new EPA administration.

#### EPA Signed Final 2021 Financial Capability Assessment for CWA Obligations

On January 12, 2021, EPA signed a federal register notice finalizing the 2021 Financial Capability Assessment (FCA) for Clean Water Act (CWA) Obligations. The 2021 FCA helps communities accurately demonstrate the financial burdens they face and increases EPA's transparency as it consistently applies FCA methodologies across the country.

When announced in the Federal Register, EPA intends that the recommended expanded matrix for water quality standards (WQS) decisions in Appendix D, along with the <u>electronic spreadsheet tools for the public sector</u>, would replace the worksheets and calculations for the public sector sections of the <u>Interim Guidance for Water Quality Standards</u>. This replacement would then guide states and authorized tribes in determining the degree of economic

## Tribal Consultation and Public Comment Opportunities

### Public Comment Opportunity: EPA's Proposed Revisions to the Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule Ends: May 10, 2021

On March 11, 2021, the EPA published the proposed revisions to the Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule (UCMR 5) for public water systems and announcement of public meeting. UCMR 5 will provide EPA, states, and communities with scientifically valid data on the national occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water.

The deadline to submit comments is May 10, 2021, for Docket ID No. EPA-HQ-OW-2020-0530. The EPA is holding a virtual stakeholder meetings on April 6 and 7, 2021 (2:00 - 4:00 PM EST). To register, click here.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is initiating consultation and coordination with federally recognized Indian Tribes and requesting comments on guidance for assessing chemical contaminant data for use in fish advisories, volume 4 risk communication. This guidance provides tribes, states, and territories information on how to develop, implement, and evaluate a risk communication program in order to have clear and effective risk communication methods for fish and shellfish advisories.

### Bureau of Indian Affairs - Tribal Climate Resilience Program

Deadline: April 23, 2021

The Tribal Climate Resilience Program supports tribes as they prepare for climate change impacts on tribal treaty and trust resources, economies, infrastructure, and human health and safety. The Program will provide funding for projects that support tribal climate resilience as tribes incorporate science (including Traditional Knowledge) and technical information. The Program also supports tribal ocean and coastal management and planning.

#### **U.S. EPA Environmental Justice Grants**

Deadline: May 7, 2021

The U.S. EPA is accepting applications for Environmental Justice Small Grants and Collaborative Problem-Solving Grant.

- **Environmental Justice Small Grants Program** This program supports and empowers communities working on solutions to local environmental and public health issues.
- Environmental Justice Collaborative Problem-Solving Cooperative Agreement Program This program provides funding for projects that address local environmental and public health issues within an affected community.

Areas of emphasis include projects focusing on:

- COVID-19 impacts on underserved communities (both)
- Climate/Disaster Resiliency (both) •
- Ports Initiative projects (small grants)
- Projects from small non-profits of 10 or fewer employees (small grants)
- New applicants and grantees (both)
