National Tribal Water Council is Accepting Applications for Membership

The National Tribal Water Council is currently accepting applications from tribal water professionals employed by a federally recognized Tribe or tribally authorized organization to fill four (4) open positions.

- **Region 2 Representative:** Open to tribal water professionals from Region 2, which includes the following states: New Jersey and New York.
- Region 6 Representative: Open to tribal water professionals from Region 6, which includes the following states: Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas.
- Region 10 Representative: Open to tribal water professionals from Region 10, which includes the following states: Alaska, Idaho, Oregon, and Washington.
 Please note: the NTWC currently has two representatives from the State of Alaska, thus seeking applicants primarily from Idaho, Oregon, or Washington.
- Navajo Nation Representative: Open to tribal water professionals from the Navajo Nation.

Member duties include but are not limited to the following:

- Participating in monthly conference calls and attending bi-annual meetings;
- Collectively crafting response documents to policy and/or rulemaking actions;
- Reviewing and discussing water-related issues in Indian Country; and
- Assisting the NTWC in informing tribes on a wide variety of water issues.

NEW! National Tribal Water Council is currently working on its 2021-2022 Priorities

The National Tribal Water Council members have been meeting for the past couple of months to develop its priorities for 2021-2022. The Council is currently finalizing the Priorities document. Once finalized, a copy will be available on the NTWC website in December.

The Council continues to focus on advocating for protection of tribal water and water-related resources, and developing comment letters in response to proposed policy and rulemaking actions. The Council has identified several new priorities that focus on collaborating with appropriate federal agencies and strengthening federal programs, such as the Clean Water Act (CWA) Section 401, to protect tribal waters and tribal water-related resources.

Water quality data is a powerful tool for understanding and communicating the quality of waters in Indian Country. The Water Data Integration Branch (WDIB) is hosting a week of webinars highlighting various tools and techniques for processing, analyzing, and communicating tribal data.

NEW! EPA and U.S. Army's Public Hearings on "Waters of the U.S."

On November 18, 2021, the EPA and U.S. Army announced the signing of the proposed rule to revise the definition of "waters of the U.S." (WOTUS). The EPA and U.S. Army propose to return to the pre-2015 definition of WOTUS. The federal agencies continue to consult with tribes, states, local governments, and other stakeholders. The agencies will be hosting virtual public hearings in January 2022.
