

Earth Day Every Day

Our Environmental Department is a mystery to many people who have no idea what we really do. We have a recycle center, greenhouses, water quality monitoring and pollution prevention programs, drinking water and

wastewater management, and land management under the umbrella of Environmental, so we are busy but not always noticed. We become more visible at our annual outreach events. We have an annual Kids Fishing Derby, Lost Creek Water Festival, Tire Collection Event, and most recently, we added Earth Day to our list of activities hosted by the Environmental Department.

People around the world celebrate Earth Day on April 22 each year with activities like

planting trees and flowers, cleaning up communities, and recycling. The Eastern Shawnee Tribe's Environmental Department participates in earthfriendly activities in daily work and provides educational activities several times a year to promote a healthier environment. Chief Glenna Wallace

challenged our department to put together a new community event in 2024, an Earth Day event to combine our regular work with a fun way to promote protecting the environment.



Other tribal departments were invited to participate and host stations in an open grassy area close to the tribe's Eastern Shawnee Early Childhood Learning Center (ECLC) and next to the Community Building where the elders gather for lunch. The event included a rain barrel raffle, snow cones and popcorn, a recycle sorting activity, seed and plant giveaways, a flowerpot painting station, soil painting, and tree circle crafts. A surprise visit from Flo the Water Drop was a big hit with the kids.

Planning started earlier for our 2025 Earth Day event. The rain barrel raffle in 2024 was so popular that a rain barrel workshop is added as a part of our 2025 event, with 25 rain barrels to give away this time, all donated. I invited a local public preschool in addition to our

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ECLC, so we are expecting lots of 4–5-year-olds. The event is open to the public, promoted with flyers in our tribal newsletter and website, emailed to employees, and posted at tribal businesses.

Indigenous people have been stewards of the earth from time immemorial, celebrating the land, water, and living things in ways that are practical and sacred. Chief Wallace tells of Shawnee tradition in gathering was to always leave the fourth one. Pick three and leave the fourth to keep growing and to have something for the future, respecting the things that sustain life. We hope that people, especially the kids, remember something from our events about good stewardship--why we protect water; why we reuse, reduce, and recycle; and why we keep planting and leave the fourth one for the future harvest.

U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service FY 2025 Tribal Wildlife Grant

Deadline: June 20, 2025

The Tribal Wildlife Grants Program provides technical and financial assistance to federally recognized Tribes for the development and implementation of programs that benefit fish and wildlife and their habitats. Funding may be used for conserving any plant or animal species of interest to a Tribe, including those of Native American cultural or traditional importance. Activities may include, but are not limited to:

- planning for wildlife and habitat conservation
- fish and wildlife conservation and management actions
- fish and wildlife related laboratory and field research
- habitat preservation

TRIBAL CONSULTATION OPPORTUNITIES

EPA's Draft Sewage Sludge Risk Assessment for PFOA and PFOS

Deadline Extended: April 16, 2025

The EPA released the Draft Sewage Sludge Risk Assessment for Perfluorooctanoic Acid (PFOA) and Perfluorooctane Sulfonic Acid (PFOS) for public comment. The draft risk assessment reflects the agency's latest scientific understanding of the potential risks to human health and the environment posed by the presence of <u>PFOA and PFOS in sewage sludge</u> that is land applied as a soil conditioner or fertilizer (on agricultural, forested, and other lands), surface disposed (e.g., placed in a sewage sludge-only landfill called a monofill), or incinerated. The EPA will accept written comments on the draft risk assessment through April 16, 2025, via Regulations.gov (Docket ID no. EPA-HQ-OW-2024-0504). EPA's Draft National Recommended Water Quality Criteria for the Protection of Human Health for PFOA, PFOS, and PFBS

Deadline Extended: April 25, 2025

The EPA has released draft national recommended health-based levels (human health criteria) for three per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) in water bodies. The three PFAS are perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA), perfluorooctane sulfonic acid (PFOS), and perfluorobutane sulfonic acid (PFBS). Human health criteria are not legally enforceable, rather they are information for local entities to consider when making local decisions about water quality. The EPA will accept written comments on the draft human health criteria until April 25, 2025.

Section 304(a) of the Clean Water Act (CWA) directs the EPA to develop and publish water quality criteria that accurately reflect the latest scientific knowledge about the effects of particular pollutants on human health and welfare. The EPA's CWA Section 304(a) human health criteria are recommendations to states and Tribes authorized to establish their own water quality standards under the CWA. Once final, these recommended criteria can be used by states and authorized Tribes to develop their own water quality criteria that help protect people from exposure through consuming water, fish and shellfish from inland and nearshore water bodies that may be contaminated by any of these PFAS. Upcoming Efforts to Revise the Definition of "Waters of the United States"

Deadline: May 20, 2025

The EPA and the U.S. Department of the Army initiated consultation with federally recognized Indian Tribes on certain key topics related to the implementation of the definition of "waters of the United States." On March 12, 2025, the agencies announced their intent to undertake a rulemaking to revise this definition in light of the Supreme Court's decision in *Sackett v. Environmental Protection Agency*, 598 U.S. 651 (2023) with a focus on clarity, simplicity and improvements that will stand the test of time.

The agencies seek the participation of Tribes and their representative associations in the upcoming Tribal listening session and invite your written input for the recommendations docket, Docket ID No. EPA-HQ-OW-2025-0093. You are welcome to participate in the listening sessions for the public. The Federal Register <u>notice</u> announcing a series of listening sessions and a 30-day written recommendations docket ID No. EPA-HQ-OW-2025-0093 https://www.regulations.gov/ is available on the EPA's website. The recommendations docket closes April 23, 2025. The agencies specifically seek feedback on the following:

- Defining "continuous surface connection," including what it means to "abut" a jurisdictional water.
- Defining "relatively permanent" and identifying relatively permanent tributaries in the field; and
- Which characteristics can provide clear and implementable distinctions between jurisdictional and nonjurisdictional ditches.
