National Tribal Water Council Outreach and Engagement

National Tribal Water Council (NTWC) members Ken Norton, NTWC Chair (Region 9), and Brian Patterson, NTWC Region 2 Representative, respectively participated in two simultaneous webinars as panelists in December.

On December 9, 2025, the National Tribal Air Association and NTWC co-hosted a [webinar](#) on EPA's Tribal Reserved Rights Rule. The webinar provided information about the status of the Tribal Reserved Rights Rule that directs states to consider the impact of state water quality standards on tribal reserved rights, such as fishing, hunting, and gathering on ceded traditional tribal lands. Currently, there are legal challenges to the rule by twelve states, and the EPA is no longer defending the rule in the legal action.

NTWC collaborated with the National Tribal Caucus to submit a joint [comment letter](#) regarding the EPA's decision not to defend the 2024 Tribal Reserved Rights Rule. The letter was sent to EPA Administrator Lee Zeldin on November 21, 2025. During the December 9th webinar, Brian Patterson provided an overview of NTWC's work and support of the rule. Brian also highlighted key points outlined in the comment letter.

On December 9, 2025, the National Congress of American Indians and Native American Rights Fund hosted a webinar on "Protecting Tribal Waters and Sovereignty: Navigating the New WOTUS Proposed Rule." The EPA and Army Corps of Engineers proposed rulemaking to revise the definition of the "Waters of the United States." The webinar discussed implications of reduced Clean Water Act protections for streams and wetlands that are essential to Tribal reserved rights, including hunting, fishing, and gathering. This webinar reviewed the proposed rule, its relationship to the *Sackett v. EPA* decision, and what it could mean for Tribal Nations.

NTWC Outreach & Engagement (*continued*)

NTWC submitted a comment letter to the EPA on the proposed WOTUS rule on December 19, 2025. Additionally, NTWC collaborated with the National Tribal Caucus to request a 30-days deadline extension for the proposed rulemaking, which was due January 5, 2026. NTWC Chair Ken Norton shared key points of the comment letter during the webinar. Chairman Norton expressed how the rollback of the CWA protections would put a strain on tribal environmental and water programs, especially with an already limited staffing and reduced program funding.

EPA Announces \$60 Million in Lead Service Line Replacement Funding Through the Drinking Water Infrastructure Grants – Tribal Set-Aside

EPA announced the availability of \$60 million in fiscal year (FY) 2025 Drinking Water Infrastructure Grants – Tribal Set-Aside (DWIG-TSA) Lead Service Line Replacement funding provided through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). These funds will enable American Indian Tribes and Alaska Native Villages to reduce exposure to lead in drinking water through investments in water system infrastructure improvements. These funds can be used for lead service line replacement and associated activities, including identification, planning, design, and construction.

Please note, the EPA released a separate [funding memorandum](#) on June 12, 2025, that provided information on FY25 funding availability and Regional allotments under the DWIG-TSA base, IIJA General Supplemental, and IIJA Emerging Contaminants appropriations as well as the Emerging Contaminants in Small or Disadvantaged Communities Tribal Grant program and the Small, Underserved, and Disadvantaged Communities (SUDC) Tribal Grant Program.

NASA Online Training Series: Monitoring Water Quality in Lakes and Coastal Regions Using STREAM

NASA has developed the Satellite-based Tool for Rapid Evaluation of Aquatic Environments ([STREAM](#)) — an interactive web tool that enables high-resolution (20–30 meter) monitoring of water quality in inland lakes and coastal waters across the U.S. and selected other countries.

This two-part training led by NASA's Applied Remote Sensing Training Program ([ARSET](#)) introduces the STREAM web tool to visualize maps of water quality parameters over lakes and coastal areas and how to use STREAM application programming interface (API) to discover and download satellite images and water quality data for a selected water body. The training demonstrates how to assess changes in water quality in each lake using QGIS. The training also demonstrates the application of an MDN model to estimate water quality parameters from satellite images.

There are two session dates on February 10 and February 17, 2026. Part 1 will include an introduction and demonstration of STREAM. Part 2 will include an introduction to a machine learning model to estimate water quality parameters based on satellite observations. The National Tribal Water Council is a technical and scientific body established to advocate for the best interests of federally-recognized Indian and Alaska Native Tribes in matters pertaining to water quality. The Council is currently accepting applications from tribal water professionals to fill three (3) openings.

Tribal water professionals with knowledge in the Clean Water Act and Safe Drinking Water Act are encouraged to apply. Also, an applicant with a background in water infrastructure, drinking water, wastewater, and operations and maintenance, is strongly encouraged.

Region 3 Representative

Open to tribal water professionals employed by a federally recognized Tribe or tribally authorized organization in Region 3 (Delaware, District of Columbia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, & West Virginia).

Region 5 Representative

Open to tribal water professionals employed by a federally recognized Tribe or tribally authorized organization in Region 5 (Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio, and Wisconsin).

At-Large Representative

Open to tribal water professionals employed by a federally recognized Tribe or tribally authorized organization in the United States (Regions 1 through 10).

Member duties include, but not limited, to:

- Participating in monthly virtual calls;
- Attending two in-person meetings annually; and
- Creating and participating in crafting response documents to policy and/or rulemaking actions.
